WELL, WHAT WOULD YOU DO? - Whatwould you do if you won the lottery? After winning \$429.6 million in a Powerball jackpot last year, Trenton, New Jersey resident Pearlie Mae Smith and her seven adult children decided to do something else entirely: they're using their prize money to help those who need it most. As a result of their good fortune, the Smiths have established a charitable foundation to help the poor in Trenton's drug- and crime-afficted South Side. "I could have gotten a yacht and never come back, but we just have a heart and mind to do this work," Valerie Arthur, one of Smith's children, told the *Times of Trenton*. The Smith Family Foundation will work with Trenton-based organizations, "one grant at a time" to "empower the community, cultivate leaders and transform lives through leadership development programs," according to the Times. Pearlie Smith, who worked in Trenton public schools, shares her philosophy of giving back with her children. One daughter, Katherine Nunnally, heads a program that mentors young women, and the others have volunteered with their church and local soup kitchens. "I think that seed has always been with us ... but after winning the lottery, we're able to do it on a much larger scale now than we have in the past," Arthur told the *Times*. The Smiths attribute their good luck (they spent \$6 to buy the winning ticket at a neighborhood 7-11) to "divine intervention." Their decision to use their windfall to help others is an inspiration to us all. As an editorial in the *Times of Trenton* put it: We'd say it was an act of divine intervention that brought the Smiths to our midst, allowing all of Trenton to bask in their generosity and civic spirit.

YOU ARE NEVER TOO OLD TO BE A FORCE FOR THE GOOD - Harold Hager, who turned 100 years old this past week, was recognized for extraordinary service - it gives us something to consider. For the last two years the centenarian has donated 20 hours a week to work for Habitat for Humanity - over 2,000 hours, which is more than any other Habitat for Humanity worker. This is only the latest in a lifetime of charitable works. Harold served in the Navy during World War II and began charity work by delivering supplies to his community during floods in 1972. In a recent interview Harold's son, who recalled how he would visit his wife every day when she had to be moved to a nursing home stated "When my mother had to actually go to the home in 2007, every day during visiting hours, during the week and through the weekends, seven days a week, he went at eleven o'clock in the morning and stayed with my mother until eight o'clock at night." After his wife passed away, in 2010, Harold threw himself into charity work. He spent several years building homes on a construction team for Habitat for Humanity. He has spent the last six years working at Habitat's ReStore in Corning, a second-hand shop that sells donated housing materials and supplies. USA today spoke with ReStore manager Jon Wylie, who explained the value Hager brings to his work, "Without Harold, I don't think we could do as much as we do now. People come in just to visit him, talk with him, and he gives us so much of his time. We'd need a lot more volunteers just to equal the amount of hours he gives us each week." Happy Birthday, Mr. Hager. May the first year of your second century bring you as much joy as you have brought to others.

WHAT IS THE ASSUMPTION OF THE BLESSED VIRGIN MARY - In the event you forgot what you learned in catechism class about the Assumption, this week's Holyday of Obligation, here are seven things to know and share.

- 1) What is the Assumption of Mary? The Assumption of Mary is the teaching that: The Immaculate Mother of God, the ever Virgin Mary, having completed the course of her earthly life, was assumed body and soul into heavenly glory [Pius XII, Munificentissimus Deus 44].
- 2) What level of authority does this teaching have? This teaching was infallibly defined by Pope Pius XII on November 1, 1950 in the bull *Munificentissimus Deus* (Latin, "Most Bountiful God"). As Pius XII explained, this is "a divinely revealed dogma" (ibid.). This means that it is a dogma in the proper sense. It is thus a matter of faith that has been divinely revealed by God and that has been infallibly proposed by the Magisterium of the Church as such.
- 3) **Does that mean it is an "ex cathedra" statement and that we have to believe it?** Yes. Since it is a dogma defined by the pope (rather than by an ecumenical council, for example), it is also an "ex cathedra" statement (one delivered "from the chair" of Peter). Pope John Paul II explained: The definition of the dogma, in conformity with the universal faith of the People of God, definitively excludes every doubt and calls for the express assent of all Christians [General Audience, July 2, 1997].
- 4) What are the earliest surviving references to Mary's Assumption? John Paul II noted: The first trace of belief in the Virgin's Assumption can be found in the apocryphal accounts entitled *Transitus Mariae* [Latin, "The Crossing Over of Mary"], whose origin dates to the second and third centuries. These are popular and sometimes romanticized depictions, which in this case, however, pick up an intuition of faith on the part of God's People.
- 5) What Scriptural basis is there for the teaching? John Paul II noted: Although the New Testament does not explicitly affirm Mary's Assumption, it offers a basis for it because it strongly emphasized the Blessed Virgin's perfect union with Jesus' destiny. This union, which is manifested, from the time of the Savior's miraculous conception, in the Mother's participation in her Son's mission and especially in her association with his redemptive sacrifice, cannot fail to require a continuation after death. Perfectly united with the life and saving work of Jesus, Mary shares his heavenly destiny in body and soul. There are, thus, passages in Scripture that resonate with the Assumption, even though they do not spell it out.

Spouse who has been lifted up to the courts of heaven with the divine Bridegroom [Munificentissimus Deus 26].

6) What are some specific New Testament passages? - Pius XII: The scholastic Doctors have recognized the Assumption of the Virgin Mother of God as something signified, not only in various figures of the Old Testament, but also in that woman clothed with the sun whom John the Apostle contemplated on the Island of Patmos (Rev. 12:1fl). Similarly they have given special attention to these words of the New Testament: "Hail, full of grace, the Lord is with you, blessed are you among women" (Luke 1:28), since they saw, in the mystery of the Assumption, the fulfillment of that most perfect grace granted to the Blessed Virgin and the special blessing that countered the curse of Eve [Munificentissimus Deus 27].

7) How can we apply this teaching to our everyday lives? - According to Pope Benedict XVI: By contemplating Mary in heavenly glory, we understand that the earth is not the definitive homeland for us either, and that if we live with our gaze fixed on eternal goods we will one day share in this same glory and the earth will become more beautiful. Consequently, we must not lose our serenity and peace even amid the thousands of daily difficulties. The luminous sign of Our Lady taken up into Heaven shines out even more brightly when sad shadows of suffering and violence seem to loom on the horizon. We may be sure of it: from on high, Mary follows our footsteps with gentle concern, dispels the gloom in moments of darkness and distress, reassures us with her motherly hand. Supported by awareness of this, let us continue confidently on our path of Christian commitment wherever Providence may lead us. Let us forge ahead in our lives under Mary's guidance [General Audience, August 16, 2006].
