After several hours of betting on 12 races the evening will conclude with dancing from 10:30 PM until 12:30 AM. To insure good luck, an additional meal of pork and sauerkraut will be served at 10:30 PM. Beer, mint juleps, champagne, and soft drinks will be available at an open bar throughout the duration of the event. A PRAYER FOR CHARLES MANSON - Almost 48 years ago, Sharon Tate was brutally murdered in her Los Angeles home by cult members acting under the instructions of Charles Manson. Convicted of murder for the death of Tate and six others, Manson died in prison of natural causes on Sunday. Debra Tate, upon hearing the news of Manson's death from a prison official, told <u>People</u> magazine, ""I said a prayer for his soul." Tate, whose sister Sharon was 8 ½ months pregnant when "Manson Family" commune members murdered her, her unborn baby, along with three of her friends, said in 2009 that she has prayed for the souls of all of the convicted killers. "My cross in my bedroom still has the flowers that I slipped into Jesus's feet when [convicted killer] Susan died," she says. "I cried a tear and I asked for forgiveness on her soul. I'll do the same thing when Charlie dies." While Tate prays for the souls of her sister's killers, she does not believe that they should ever get out of prison. "These are sociopaths," she told *People*. "They're no less violent today than they were then." One of the convicted killers, Leslie Van Houten, was granted parole last year, but California's Gov. Jerry Brown, rejected her release. Her case is again before the parole board and her release could be once again blocked.

A STORY THAT SHOULD CHALLENGE YOU - Because there are over 1 billion Catholics in the world today coupled with the fact that the Church is 2,000 years old, it's understandable that many remarkable stories go untold. In all honesty, the saintly men and women who have lived lives of holiness would never want recognition or attention. While they may not seek it, at times there are stories that can serve to inspire us - one follows below. I (Father Aron) am friends with Sr. Judith Krantz, the successor of Mother Antonia. Her stories about the foundress of her community are inspiring and challenging. Please take a minute to read and think about what a good and happy life looks like. -Mary Brenner was a twice-divorced mother of eight children when she began doing volunteer work for the poor in Mexico in the 1960s. She had been active in charity work in California while she was married, but her devotion intensified after a priest led her to La Mesa state penitentiary, which housed convicted murderers, gang leaders, rapists and other serious felons. Ms. Brenner began providing for inmates' basic needs, giving them aspirin, blankets, toiletries and prescription eveglasses. She sang in worship services. She received a prison contract to sell soda to prisoners and used the proceeds to bail out low-level offenders. If a prisoner died, of illness or in a gang fight, she prepared him for burial. Inmates told how Mother Antonia once walked into the middle of a prison riot while bullets flew and tear gas filled the air. When the inmates saw her, fearless in her habit, the fighting stopped. She never seemed to stop smiling. She had taken private vows and sewn her own habit in her early years volunteering in Mexico. The bishops of Tijuana and San Diego later officially accepted her work as part of church ministry. "At age 50," according to a biography on the order's website, "she had become a sister." Around the same time, she moved into the women's section of the prison in a cell that was about 10 feet by 10 feet. She could come and go freely, but she devoted herself to the lives inside. Her mission constantly expanded, from the inmates and guards to their families. "It's different to live among people than it is to visit them," she told The Washington Post in 2002. "I have to be here with them in the middle of the night in case someone is stabbed, in case someone has an appendix [attack], in case someone dies." Mary Clarke was born on Dec. 1, 1926, in Los Angeles and grew up in Beverly Hills, Calif., the second of three children. Her mother, Kathleen, died while pregnant with her fourth child. Her father, Joseph, was a successful sales executive in the office supply industry, and the family had a second home overlooking the ocean. She married at 18, but it did not last long. A second marriage, to Carl Brenner, lasted 25 years, but it also ended in divorce. As she struggled in her second marriage, she became increasingly involved with serving the poor in Southern California and Mexico. She worked early on with a Los Angeles priest, Msgr. Anthony Brouwers. He died of cancer in 1964. More than a decade later, when she became a nun, she renamed herself in his memory. She had moved to San Diego by the 1970s, which made it easier to travel into Mexico while sharing custody of her children. Most of her children were grown but not all of them. When her youngest, Anthony, was a teenager, she gave custody of him to Mr. Brenner. She was a "basket case" at the time, she said in an interview for a 2005 book about her, The Prison Angel, by Mary Jordan and Kevin Sullivan. But she believed the decision was right. "When you know in your heart that something is right, that it's who you are, that God is calling you to do something," she said, "you make the sacrifices you have to make." She remained in regular contact with her children, and many of them visited her at La Mesa. She died in 2013 at the age of 86. Sister

Anne Marie, who is one of about two dozen nuns in the Eudist Servants of the 11th Hour, said that Mother Antonia started the order a little more than a decade ago at the urging of diocesan leaders in Tijuana and that it was sanctioned by Archbishop Rafael Romo Muñoz. "Pleasure depends on where you are, who you are with, what you are eating," Mother Antonia told *The Post.* "Happiness is different. Happiness does not depend on where you are. I live in prison. And I have not had a day of depression in 25 years. I have been upset, angry. I have been sad. But never depressed. I have a reason for my being."
