**THE HEART OF A FATHER** - As part of his role as the Papal Almoner, Archbishop Konrad Krajewski, has been responsible for many initiatives on behalf of the poor in Rome including the installation of showers, a barbershop and laundromat near the Vatican, as well as the building of a new dormitory for the needy. However few people know that behind the scenes the Polish archbishop also gave up his Vatican apartment for a refugee family and has for several months been sleeping in his office. Born in Lodz, Poland in 1963, the Polish archbishop takes seriously the assignment Pope Francis entrusted to him when he was appointed in 2013. "Sell your desk; you don't need it," the pope told him at the time. "Don't wait for people to come ringing. You need to go out and look for the poor." When the archbishop learned about a Syrian refugee couple with a newborn baby he let the family live in his apartment. In an interview with *La Repubblica* the archbishop said that what he did is a normal thing, "nothing unusual." "There are many priests in the world, not just recently, behave like this. Charity and sharing are in the DNA of the Church. To each he is asked something according to his task. I have no family, I am a simple priest. To offer my apartment doesn't cost me anything," he said.

**A FEW THOUGHTS ON FATHERHOOD** - I (Fr. Aron) recently read a short article by Carolyn Woo, a distinguished president's fellow for global development at Purdue University and former CEO and president of Catholic Relief Services from 2012 to 2016. She makes a few interesting points, her thoughts follow - While visiting with friends and family who work with the homeless population and elderly veterans, the conversation turned to how

many of these men are estranged from their families. Some have had no interaction with their children for decades. This brokenness, deep and searing, is probably encrusted in dark stories of abandonment, addiction or abuse. 25 percent of this country's children are raised by single mothers. This statistic also denotes the widespread phenomenon of dads who are AWOL. Father's Day happily offers an official day to put our dads on the pedestal for their love, sacrifices and impact on us. Yet, clearly not everyone has this wonderful dad. The relationships between fathers and children are often painful, and many father narratives include shadows and wounds: some small and some big; some long healed, others still gaping; some making us laugh, others drawing tears. Sometimes damage gets carried forward from one generation to another. We probably know a father whose explosive temper, modeled after his own father, shut down communication with his children. Or a young woman whose father left her mother, and so she is gripped by fear that all men would do the same, thereby placing a heavy burden on each person she dates. These stories abound and testify to the impact of fathers on their children. Given fathers' primal significance to us as shelter and security, affirmation and first authority, these dynamics can mold us in behavior, attitudes, sense of worth and even perspectives about God. A recent op-ed in The New York Times, "The Birth of a Mother," observes that there is woefully insufficient attention given to the psychological transformation of a mother because the focus is on the physical wellbeing of the mother and child. Worse, discussion on the transformation and trauma of fatherhood is almost nonexistent. Prenatal classes teach dads what to expect during birth and how to hold, feed, burp, change and bathe the baby. This constitutes THE preparation for fatherhood. The rest of it, like how to deal with the fear of such a huge responsibility, the resentment of losing one's independence and how to set boundaries for space, time and resources are left to the individual's improvisation from scripts in one's own background and from trial and error. When does guidance become dictate? How does correction become humiliation? At what point do expectations cripple the child? How does one recall angry words? To whom can a father turn when he feels inept, overwhelmed and wants to flee? This essay is not about passing judgment, giving an easy pass or diminishing the hurt and suffering from these fatherchild experiences. But it is a call for empathy for our fathers for their failings or inability to express love and regret even when they have these feelings. It is a call to let go of the father we wish we had or the one who disappointed us for the father who needs grace and our tenderness. It is a call for healing that may be beyond us, but not beyond God, the only perfect Father.

**CALL NO MAN ON EARTH YOUR FATHER** -In St. Matthew's gospel (23:8), we are told to call no one on earth our father. Some anti-Catholic people feel this verse relates specifically to Catholic priests and refuse to use the customary title of "Father" when addressing a priest and instead refer to priests as "Mister." If you were presented with this issue would you know how to respond? First of all the person who substitutes "Mister" for "Father" should take a look at Matthew 23:10 (two verses later) which states, "Neither be called masters, for you have one master, the Christ." If he/she is calling priests (or anybody else for that matter) "Mister" then he/she has a problem on their hands because "Mister" is just another form of the word "Master" (the title appearing around the year 1545). You may also wish to point out that their position runs contrary to the example of the apostles who understood themselves as spiritual fathers of those under their care (see 1 Cor. 4:14-15, 2 Cor. 12:14, Phil. 2:22, Philem. 10). Additionally these early church leaders regarded those under their care as their spiritual children (see 1 Cor. 4:17, 1 Tim. 1:2, 18, 2 Tim. 2:2, 2 Tim. 2:1). If the title "Father" is strictly forbidden then the term "Mister" is equally forbidden by Matthew 23. Given the apostolic example we know that what Jesus was condemning those who acted as spiritual gurus or had a cult of personality that put themselves or their teaching at the center of their ministry. This indeed is very different than the concept of spiritual fatherhood.
