POPE'S CHOIR TO VISIT U.S. - This month, Americans will have an opportunity to hear one of the oldest choirs in the world live and in person when the choir brings a program of Renaissance polyphony and Gregorian chant to three U.S. cities. It will be the first trip for the Sistine Chapel Choir, officially known as the *Cappella Musicale Pontificia*, to the U.S. in three decades. The Sistine Chapel Choir will sing at St. Patrick's Cathedral in New York Sept. 16, on the campus of The Catholic University of America at the Basilica of the National Shrine of the Immaculate Conception, which seats around 2,000 people, in Washington, D.C., Sept. 20, and at the Detroit Opera House Sept. 23. Composed of 22 adult male professional singers, the choir also features 30 boy singers ("Pueri Cantores") who are selected through an arduous process of auditions and attend a special school in Rome during their five-year commitment to performing in the choir. The choir is the last remnant of what was the papal court. While some sources date the choir to the early centuries of Church history, it can more accurately be traced to the end of the Avignon papacy in the 15th century, when Pope Martin V returned to Rome in 1417, exactly 600 years ago. Compositions by Pierluigi de Palestrina, celebrated as the "Prince of Roman Polyphony," remain a staple of the Vatican-based choir's repertoire. In speaking of the choir, prefect of the Papal Household, Archbishop George Gänswein, stated, "This is intended to express that outbound Church of which Pope Francis speaks," he added, "a Church that is not afraid to speak the language of man and his needs, of which music is a high and universal expression."

JAGERMEISTER AND THE COMMUNION OF SAINTS - Jägermeister is a popular alcoholic drink that tastes like licorice and comes in a bottle that looks like 1800s medicine. If you've ever seen the bottle, you are familiar with the emblem of a shining cross over a stag's head, but did you know where that symbol comes from? The symbol is taken from the story of St. Hubert. St. Hubert was a noble of one of the great houses of the Merovingian kingdoms. Shortly after his wife died in childbirth, his grief led him to go on an extended hunt. On Good Friday morning, Hubert was in pursuit of a magnificent stag when suddenly the animal turned to face him. He was in awe of a Crucifix between its antlers when he heard a voice say to him: "Hubert, unless thou turnest to the Lord, and leadest a holy life, thou shalt quickly go down into hell." Hubert knelt down and replied, "Lord, what wouldst Thou have me do?" He received the answer, "Go and seek Lambert, and he will instruct you." The vision changed the life of Saint Hubert, who devoted his life to the faith and became the Bishop of Liège in 708 and was in time given the title "Apostle of the Ardennes." Jägermeister, which means "Hunt Master," took the symbol in reference to St. Hubert. They explain this [on their website](#), "Only a legendary stag's head would suffice, one with a beaming cross between its antlers. The stag that appeared to a wild hunter and converted him to Christianity. The same hunter who would later become the patron saint of all hunters: Saint Hubertus. This stag remains today, as it always has been, the Jägermeister trademark. A symbol of the preservation of our quality and tradition." Jägermeister is an enjoyable drink but one that can hit you quickly. It's worth noting that Catholicism has a patron saint for everything. If you plan on partaking, you may want to acquaint yourself with [Saint Bibiana](#), the patron saint of hangovers.
