**WHY ARE THE STATUES COVERED?** – As you may have noticed upon entering the church this weekend that the statues and images are veiled, or covered in violet cloth, and will remain covered until

Easter. Where does this practice come from and why do we observe this old custom? While the practice of the custom may vary to a degree from place to place, images are typically veiled from before the vigil Mass of the Fifth Sunday of Lent until Easter. In some places images and statues are actually removed from the church and not simply veiled. Neither the Stations of the Cross nor stained glass windows are ever veiled. Noted liturgist Monsignor Peter Elliott has pointed out, "The custom of veiling crosses and images ... has much to commend it in terms of religious psychology, because it helps us to concentrate on the great essentials of Christ's work of Redemption." Although this is true, the historical origin of this practice lies elsewhere. It probably derives from a custom, noted in Germany from the ninth century, of extending a large cloth before the altar from the beginning of Lent. Some authors say there was a practical reason for this practice insofar as the often-illiterate faithful needed a way to know it was Lent. For analogous motives, later on in the Middle Ages, the images of crosses and saints were also covered from the start of Lent.

**STATIONS OF THE CROSS** – Stations of the Cross will be held every Friday during the Lenten Season at 7:00 PM. This week Stations will be held at the St. John the Baptist worship site.

**RANDOM HISTORICAL NOTES ABOUT THE STATIONS OF THE CROSS** – The emperor Constantine permitted Christians to legally worship in the Roman Empire in 313 after 250 years of persecution. In 335, he erected the Church of the Holy Sepulcher at the site where Jesus' tomb was believed to have been. Processions of pilgrims to the church, especially during Holy Week, began soon after its completion. Pilgrimages eventually took a fixed route from the ruins of the Fortress Antonia, where Pilate had his judgment hall, to the Church of the Holy Sepulcher. That route through Jerusalem's Old City gained acceptance as the way Jesus went to his death and remains unchanged today. It is known as the Via Dolorosa, Latin for the "Sorrowful Way." The pilgrims visited the holy sites they brought back oil from the lamps that burned around Jesus' tomb and relics from the holy places, and sometimes tried to recreate in Europe what they had seen in the Holy Land. The Moslem conquest of Palestine in the seventh century made such shrines more significant, since it made travel to the Holy Land dangerous. Devotions to the Way of the Cross began in earnest after 1342, when the Franciscan friars were given custody of the holy sites in the Holy Land. The Franciscans have been closely identified with the devotion ever since; for years, Church regulations required a set of the stations to be blessed by a Franciscan when possible. The number of stations varied widely, with some manuals of devotion listing as many as 37. The term "stations" in describing the Way of the Cross was first used in the narrative of an English pilgrim, William Wey, who visited the Holy Land twice in the 15th century. Depictions of the events described in the Stations did not start becoming common in churches until Pope Innocent XI permitted the Franciscans in 1686 to erect such displays in all their churches. Pope Clement XII allowed all churches to have stations and fixed the number at 14, where it has been ever since. In recent years, many churches have included the Resurrection as a 15th station. Benedict XIV specifically urged every church in 1742 to enrich its sanctuary with stations. St. Alphonsus Ligouri in 1787 wrote the version of the Stations that most Americans recognize because it was used in most churches in the United States throughout the 19th and 20th centuries.
