SOMETHING TO PONDR ON JULIAN CALENDAR CHRISTMAS - Russia's Orthodox Church has opened 30,000 churches over the last 30 years, although it is expected to take until 2050 to return to what it was before the 1917 revolution, reported *The Tablet*, a British Catholic newsweekly. "Houses of worship aren't built as architectural or artistic monuments - they're there for the people," said Metropolitan Hilarion Alfeyev, the Moscow Patriarchate's external relations director. "And we don't build churches to obtain impressive statistics, but because people want them. It shouldn't be forgotten that the construction or renovation of most churches is financed by the faithful - both small people and big entrepreneurs." Metropolitan Hilarion said that the Orthodox Church has dedicated three churches a day since 1988, and now has 40,000. He said that it would take until 2050 to attain the 80,000 churches held before the Bolshevik Revolution took place 100 years ago. In addition, Hilarion said that the Russian Orthodox Church now has 940 monasteries, compared to the 1500 that existed before the Soviets came to power. Following the Bolshevik's seizure of power, hundreds of Orthodox priests were killed, and churches and monasteries were closed and desecrated. Since the collapse of the Soviet Union in 1991, the Orthodox Church has undergone a dramatic resurgence, and enjoys the support of President Vladimir Putin, who is often seen on national television attending church services. An interesting comparison can be made by looking at the Lutheran Church of Sweden. A recent survey by the Church of Sweden found that about two-thirds of the country's 9.4 million people belong to the church. **Yet only 15 percent of church members say they believe in Jesus Christ.** An equal percentage of Swedes call themselves atheists. And only about 400,000 of the roughly 6.6 million members of the church say they attend services at least once a month. The survey, conducted by Jonas Bromander, chief analyst of the Church of Sweden, also found that membership continues to decline (at an accelerating pace), from about 95 percent of the population 40 years ago to the historically low 68.8 percent today. Sven Björkberg, a pastor who serves several parishes southwest of Stockholm, says that Swedes, too, support the church because it guards important national values and traditions and does good work, such as helping the poor and the elderly and comforting the lonely. He says he believes in Jesus Christ, **which is not a requirement for Church of Sweden clergy.** (Affirming women's ordination to the ministry *is* required). A December poll by the Swedish opinion research organization Sifo found that 83 percent of Swedes believe that Christmas should be about family, compared to a good meal (55%), attending church (12 percent) and

celebrating the birth of Jesus (10 percent). H.B. Hammar, a Lutheran cleric, said that of the 3,384 churches in Sweden only 500 or so are used at most once a month. "With fewer and fewer paying members, you have to review your options," he wrote in the national daily newspaper *Svenska Dagbladet*, "and do it before it is too late." Hammar said that hundreds of churches need immediate renovation, costing billions. They could also be sold to private individuals and used for housing, cafés, offices or light industry. While the Church of Sweden continues to lose members, a religious awakening of sorts has been occurring in the country thanks to the gradual influx of hundreds of thousands of immigrants, or "new Swedes," over the past few decades. Today, roughly 15 percent of the population is foreign-born. There are now 92,000 Roman Catholics and 100,000 Eastern Orthodox Christians living in Sweden. The Pew Research Center recently reported that there also about 40,000 Buddhists, 20,000 Hindus and 10,000 Jews. But it also said that Sweden today has a significant Muslim population: some 430,000. Some analysts have predicted that the Muslim minority in Sweden will increase from about 5 percent today to 10 percent by 2030. – *Good question for a religious conversation – why the difference between the two?*

MANDATORY MEETING – There will be a mandatory meeting for all CCD teachers, employees, volunteers who work near children, Scout leaders, and **ALL** adults going to Rome on Monday February 5th at 6:30 PM at St. John's. The meeting is to complete the child clearance training required by the diocese. The information that comes from this meeting helps to create greater awareness and remind us of the need to provide a safe environment for children in our parish.

MARDI GRAS PARTY – The parish will sponsor a Mardi Gras party on Saturday February 10th. The evening will include festive food, drink, and dancing. Music will be provided by Krazy Kat Daddies, an oldies band. The event is free and open to parishioners and their guests. It is asked that all in attendance bring a covered dish. The meal begins at 6:00 PM with dancing from 7:00 PM until 10:00

MARRIAGE MILESTONES – Some couples mark the length of a marriage with paper, wood, silver or gold anniversaries.
