PRAYER AFTER MASS – During Lent our parish will pray the St. Michael Prayer after all Masses. This prayer was recited after every Low Mass (for those old enough to remember this term) from 1884 until early 1965. This prayer was part of what were called the Leonine Prayers, these prayers never formed part of the Mass but were prayed after Mass (sometimes called 'Prayers after Low Mass') at the request of Pope Leo XIII. We will pray this prayer as a way of asking God, through the intercession of St. Michael, to deliver us from evil, especially during this season of penance where we are more acutely aware of our fight against evil. In the event you forgot the words please use feel free to use the text:

Saint Michael the Archangel,

defend us in battle, be our defense against the wickedness and snares of the devil; may God rebuke him, we humbly pray; and do thou, O Prince of the heavenly host, by the power of God, cast into hell Satan and all the evil spirits who prowl through the world seeking the ruin of souls. Amen

EXCITING PROJECT - At the most recent meeting of the parish council the council approved a project which would see the hiring of a professional film company to produce a short film for our website about our parish. A little bit of background is in order. Today the first place most visitors, and for that matter non-engaged Catholics, look to learn about our parish is the internet. This makes the parish website a very important element in our parish as for many it is the first introduction to who we are as a parish. Thus the website needs to grab and sustain your attention. A short film on the parish - who we are, our history, and the texture of the lived experience of Catholicism in Central City has the potential to engage far more visitors than many printed pages. Like it or not, it's just the nature of life in 2019. Point two. Our hundredth anniversary as a parish, depending on how you figure it, fell between 2014 and 2017. During that time we had no solemn Mass, festive party, or commemorative book. Prior to the merger of our parishes, both churches published books on the occasion of their 50^{th} anniversary about the history of the parish and where they were at the time of the jubilee. Though smaller in size, similar books were written at the 75^{th} anniversary as well. This film will help to capture where we are in and around our 100° year. The film is not meant to be a commercial, but a look at where we are, a "living time capsule" that will hopefully convey the message that we are alive and love our heritage and our faith. With all of this in mind it is asked if you have pictures from sacramental celebrations, church events, or historic photos from our parish please consider letting them be used for this presentation (not everything will be used). May crowning, baptisms, old film footage, etc. are greatly appreciated. Any such photographs will be returned as soon as the producer copies them for possible use. These need dropped off ASAP. Moreover any suggestions on events in the parish history that need mentioned would be welcome. Any questions about this can be directed to Father Aron.

FORTY DAYS – FORTY THINGS – During Lent we want to de-emphasize ourselves and emphasize our dependence on God. Almsgiving (materially sharing with those in need) is one of the three "pillars" of Lent. (The other two pillars are prayer and fasting.) We can give in ways other than money. In giving up things around our house that we don't need, we can detach from "stuff" while helping others. Here's the challenge: During the 40 days of Lent, find one thing each day you no longer need. For most of us, this should be really easy. It could be a kitchen item, a jacket, a bike, an unopened gift hanging around. Go through your closets, drawers, basement, even the garage. Find someone or somewhere to which to donate it. I'm keeping a bag by the door into which I'll put my donations, except of course for bigger things. As a reminder for my young adult kids, I'm labeling it "40 Items in 40 Days." (Lent hasn't even started and there are already 10-12 items in there... some of us have way too much stuff!) There are so many places these things can go to good use. Most of my things will go to a thrift shop I love, run by a parish near me. Volunteers man the shop and go through donations to categorize and price. Others come in and buy what they need at far less than new cost. The money supports the parish. You might know of something similar near you. Think of places that take donations of things in good condition: crisis pregnancy centers take maternity and baby items including car seats, strollers, cribs, Pack-n-Plays; veterans' groups often take furniture and clothing; parish outreach centers usually take pretty much anything including dishes, sheets and towels in good condition, clothes, toys, books, sports items. The Salvation Army and St. Vincent de Paul accept most donations. In some cases and in some areas, they even pick up larger things. As we clear our closets, we can clear our minds. As we de-clutter we can think of those less fortunate. And be grateful for our blessings.

BUS TRIP - On Sunday May 19th our parish will be sponsoring a bus trip to visit historic churches and eat delicious food in the city of Cleveland. While the trip had originally been planned for Pittsburgh there was an unexpected scheduling change at one of the parishes and the decision was made to visit Cleveland instead. Departing via Bollman motor coach (5:00 AM) the day in Cleveland will begin with Latin High Mass at St. Stephen's Church, an old German ethnic parish, on Cleveland's West Side. Following Mass, we will head to the historic West Side Market. Home to meat, spice, and produce vendors, the market also has a variety of lunch counters available for lunch (on your own). Following lunch, the group will visit the Irish St. Colman Parish, followed by the Polish St. Stanislaus Parish, an incredible church built in the "Polish Cathedral" style. Our last stop before dinner will be at St. Vitus Church, the largest Slovenian ethnic parish in the United States. Dinner will be at Guarino's Restaurant, Cleveland's oldest Italian restaurant. Dinner includes locally baked bread, house salad with Guarino's homemade Italian dressing, nonalcoholic beverage, and a choice of chicken parmesan, spaghetti with meatballs, eggplant roll ups, or homemade lasagna (cash bar available). We should arrive back in Central City at 10:30 PM. The trip is open to anyone – first come, first served. The cost is \$80.00 per person and includes dinner.
