The breakfast includes scrambled eggs, bacon, sausage, hash browns, sausage gravy and biscuits, pancakes, French toast, donuts, toast, juice and coffee. Proceeds go to benefit the activities for the parish religious education students.

REMEMBER WHEN? - Older residents of Central City are familiar with the tradition of the "Gubi" of "Kuba," a Slavic custom that seems to have died out in our community around fifty years ago. Practiced in Carptho-Rusyn and Slovak villages, the famed carolers (known in Slovak as jaslickari) are remembered by senior Central Citians for their legendary home visits this time of year. The custom, as practiced in Europe and later in American towns with high Slavic populations, included carolers who visited homes on or near Christmas dressed as angels and shepherds carrying a miniature church (typical in Subcarpathia) or led in procession by a star on a pole (more common in the Lemko Region/Galicia). The peculiar dress of the jaslickari featured carolers wearing white garments with tall cylinder hats and brightly colored ribbons across their chests, carrying staves, perhaps with a bell at the end. The guba, kuba, dido or staryj pastyr, the oldest shepherd (with a mask on his face served as the main character and also the comedian. As the carolers went from door-to-door, the kuba or gubi chased children with his wooden hatchet and threatened to kidnap the bad ones. Some Gubi chased the attractive women, attempting to steal a kiss. Another adult represented St. Nicholas. This character carried a container for donations from each household. The donations were later divided among the adult carolers and an official from the local church. When the carolers entered a home, they placed a nativity shrine on the dining room table, after which each shepherd would kneel before it and say a particular verse: "For behold, I bring unto you, tidings of great joy, which shall be unto all people. For unto you is born this day in the city of David, a Savior, who is Christ the Lord." In so doing, the carolers reminded each family they visited of the Angels who brought tidings of great joy to the shepherds as they watched their sheep at night. The "Bethlehem Play" they presented was a short presentation of carols, sung greetings (koljadky), dialogue, dancing, and the announcement of Christ's birth. In some villages a puppet play, vertep (the cave) was presented. At the conclusion of the visit, the family rewarded the carolers with drinks or coins to thank them for their long journey from home to home. - It is a tradition worth reviving!

THE ACTUAL DATE OF CHRISTMAS - Rebecca Salazar, a molecular biologist, catechist, and mother of three who blogs at On the Care and Feeding of Geeks recently shared some thoughts about the actual date of Christ's birth. Her words are worthy of some consideration. -Long ago, I accepted the idea that December 25 was probably not the actual date of Christ's birth, that the real date was unknown but probably in the spring. Knowing the exact date doesn't really impact the liturgical celebration, after all. It was just one more sad thing about being an adult, one more little bit of wonder gone from life. Since then, I've become well acquainted with the historical evidence in favor of a date of December 25. The date can be derived historically from the dating of Zechariah's entry into the temple to burn incense. It can also be derived theologically from the ancient tradition that a great prophet entered and left the world on the same calendar day. Thus, the Annunciation was determined to have occurred on the same day as the crucifixion, March 25. December 25 naturally follows nine months later. They are good arguments, held to strict standards of historical research and logic, within their own fields. But neither ever quite satisfied my desire for something really concrete. One continual objection was that the shepherds in the fields at night were presumed to be attending to the dropping of lambs. And lambs didn't drop in December. Lambs dropped in the spring, not the winter. So, when yet another person asked "Why do we celebrate Christmas in December if lambs are born in the spring?" instead of explaining the significance of March 25, I suddenly wondered: ARE lambs actually born in the spring in Israel? Can I find out? The Awassi sheep is a desert sheep, a fattailed breed that has existed in the Middle East for an estimated 5,000 years. It is the only indigenous breed of sheep in Israel. They are raised for wool, meat, and milk. Awassi sheep breed in the summer and drop lambs in the winter, when there is sufficient pasture for the ewes in milk. In Israel, the principal lambing season is December through January. This is practical, I thought. This is fact. This is biology. Sheep estrus, it turns out, varies according to breed. In northern breeds, estrus is triggered by the shortening of daylight after the autumn equinox. Breeding occurs naturally in October to November, and lambs are dropped in March and April. But, as you move geographically closer to the equator, the days don't shorten as dramatically. Instead, sheep from subtropical and tropical areas tend to breed earlier, and drop lambs in the winter, or even breed and drop lambs year round. This one little tidbit of information, for me, crystallized all the others. Of course Jesus, the Lamb of God, was born at the same time and in the same place as all of the Passover lambs. Of course this time was such that the day of His entry to and exit from the world are the same. Of course the nativity of John the Baptist is when it is because Jesus' birth really is when it is. Biology places great value on symmetry, and here was a symmetry to delight my intellect, a symmetry of history and theology and biology. Earlier, I had honestly mourned the loss of my childish wondering; now I find that this understanding has produced a greater and deeper wonder at the providence of God.
