NEW BALTIMORE FISH FRY -Why would one forego a buffet for a mere fish dinner? This is America, a land of liberty and prosperity. With the lofty concepts of choosing your own fish entrees and with the ability to eat as many as you wish (without succumbing to gluttony) I am officially endorsing the All You Can Eat Fish Buffet at St. John the Baptist Church in New Baltimore and am declaring it the best value going on a Friday during Lent. Beginning on Friday, February 28th, and continuing every Friday of Lent (March 6th, 13th, 20th, 27th, & April 3rd) an all you can eat bonanza of baked & fried fish, fried shrimp, fried clams, soup, baked potato, vegetables, salad & dessert bar and beverage is available in the parish hall from 3:30 PM until 6:30 PM. At \$14.00 for adults, \$4.00 for ages 5-11, and free for under 5 years, it's a good deal and a great way to help our neighbor parish pay their bills. Fr. Aron has officially endorsed this fish fry as the greatest in America or perhaps even the world.

SORT OF INTERESTING - Within the gold foil wrapping of a Ferrero Rocher candy is multi-layered confection that is unique and delicious - a single roasted hazelnut, encased in a wafer shell filled with hazelnut chocolate, which is itself topped with chocolate studded with chopped hazelnuts. When the Italian chocolatier Michele Ferrero introduced the treats in 1982, he named them "Rocher" after the craggy rock grotto, called the Rocher de Massabielle, that marks the place where the Blessed Mother appeared to St. Bernadette in Lourdes, France. The chocolates' hazelnut-pocked surface bears more than a passing resemblance to the rock formation at Lourdes, a place that had a special meaning for Ferrero, who died on Valentine's Day in 2015 at the age of 89. A devout Catholic, Ferrero was known for his strong devotion to Our Lady. At the celebration of the 50th anniversary of the founding of his company, he said: "The success of Ferrero we owe to Our Lady of Lourdes; without her we can do little." As the third largest chocolate producer in the world, Ferrero had a lot to be thankful for. The Ferrero Rocher candies, along with Nutella, Kinder treats and Tic Tacs, brought in over \$10 billion Euros in 2016. Ferrero was said to have made an annual pilgrimage to Lourdes, taking his top manager. He also organized a visit to the shrine for his employees, and had a statue of the Virgin Mary placed in each of his company's 14 production facilities around the world.

WINE & FOOD PAIRING EVENT - Catholic Charities of the Diocese of Altoona-Johnstown is having a wine tasting event at the Holiday Inn, Downtown Johnstown on Thursday, February 27. Doors open at 5:30 PM and tasting begins at 6:00 PM. The event will focus on a different part of the world's wines and pair each wine with a "small plate" of food. A REMINDER ABOUT EVIL - Twenty-four hundred eleven aborted babies, victims of abortionist Ulrich Kloper who were found on his property, were finally laid to rest this past week in a state-sponsored funeral service. Indiana attorney general Curtis Hill spoke at a funeral service at South Bend's Southlawn Cemetery and Palmer Funeral Home for the 2,411 children whose bodies or body parts were preserved and stored by Kloper in his garage and the trunk of a car. Klopfer himself died on September 6, 2019 at the age of 79. His relatives discovered the majority of the human remains in 79 boxes while they were sorting through Klopfer's belongings at his Crete, Illinois home. Later, more bodies were discovered in a car kept in Chicago. According to the Daily Caller, Attorney General Hill said the infants could not be buried in the home states of their mothers because of their disintegrating condition. He also said that by giving them a burial, "we fulfill our obligation as a state pursuant to law and conscience to the unborn babies whose lives were terminated in clinics in Fort Wayne, Gary, and South Bend." Hill called the discovery of the fetal remains "horrifying to anyone with normal sensibilities." He also suggested that there is evidence that some of the unborn children were killed when they were in their third trimester. It is not known why the abortionist kept the bodies of his victims. According to the Daily Caller, Klopfer ran three different abortuaries in Indiana and performed over 30,000 abortions since he began his career in 1974. His medical license was suspended in 2016. As pro-life group Operation Rescue has extensively documented, Klopfer had a history of abuses, including failing to report the statutory rapes of two girls. He sent an eleven-year-old victim home with her parents, who knew their daughter had been raped by her uncle but didn't want him prosecuted, without reporting the crime to police. After the bodies were found, the president and CEO of Indiana Right to Life stated that his own organization was "horrified." "We are horrified by the reports of over 2,000 fetal remains being found on the property of Dr. Ulrich Klopfer, a man who operated abortion facilities in Gary, South Bend, and Fort Wayne," said Mike Fichter. "These sickening reports underscore why the abortion industry must be held to the highest scrutiny. We are calling on Indiana authorities to join in the investigation to determine if these fetal remains have any connection to abortion operations, or personnel, in Indiana."

ROSES ARE RED, VIOLETS ARE ODIOUS - WONT YOU BE MY CYRIL & **METHODIUS?** - Fr. Leo E. Patalinghug Ivdei offers some reflections on the connection between Valentine's Day and St. Cyril and Methodius Day (since the calendar revisions of Pope Paul VI St. Valentine was removed from the Universal Calendar and February 14th was given to Saints Cyril and Methodius). His words follow - It's ironic that the most romantic day of the year occurs in one of the least romantic months. I remember as a parish priest, there were few weddings but many funerals during February. And, the church calendar reserves February 14th to commemorate Sts. Cyril and Methodius – brothers, missionaries and theologians who created the Cyrillic alphabet for the Slavic nations. Hardly romantic! Yet, good evangelists see this day as a great opportunity — perhaps even greater than the "Santa-fied" version of Christmas – to promote the true meaning of love! On Valentine's Day, we ought to make a connection between Sts. Valentine, Cyril and Methodius as they offer an example and image of true love. Missionary brothers Cyril and Methodius created a language. St. Valentine shows us love by his actions of self-sacrifice in defense of Christian marriage. Isn't that what couples should be doing for each other vowing fidelity even in bad, sick and austere times of their marriage? In these saints we see an image of what true love involves — toil, struggle and perseverance. That's why love looks like a heart violently pierced with an arrow. Love requires passion! But passion is misunderstood. The word comes from the Latin root pati, a verb that means "to suffer!" Valentine suffered. Cyril and Methodius, by leaving their homeland, suffered. Trying to learn and create another language didn't come easily. Put simply, if love doesn't involve personal sacrifice or suffering, it probably isn't genuine Christian love. This isn't to depress anyone, but to encourage people to take up their cross as the greatest act of love. The faithful must be assured that when things are tough, God provides an opportunity to strengthen one's understanding of love by offering mercy, compassion, and humility to listen. In my book, Spicing Up Married Life, I encourage couples to get rid of anniversaries. Why wait one year to celebrate love!? With 12 chapters in the book, a couple can celebrate "month-aversaries" - monthly dinner dates. This regularity encourages consistent communication through spending time together, feeding each other's hungers, and learning to listen to what God is saying to you through your spouse. Good communication is in itself a form of "passion." In this book of bite-sized theological chapters about a theology of marriage, question conversation starters, and 12 thematic recipes for two, I share how a regular delicious dinner can help a couple to love each other by listening to each other. In this unromantic time of the year, we have at least three saints to teach us what love looks like. Talk about this on your next dinner date! It may be a chore to set aside one each month, but the "sacrifice" can help you find what you're seeking - true love, which requires nurturing all year long.
