UNTIL DEATH HAIRDO US PART -What a good story! San Antonio residents Theresa and Andrew have been married for nearly 45 years, but only recently has Andrew begun learning to style Theresa's hair for her. After suffering a stroke 18 years ago, Theresa has struggled to style her hair the way she used to. After a trip to the salon she was given for Mothers' Day, her new hairstyle was ruined in the shower the next morning — but Andrew wasn't going to give up. Knowing how happy she had been with her new style, he returned to the salon, hoping to buy all the products necessary to re-create the look for her. When Andrea Gomez, the stylist who had done Theresa's hair, realized his plan, she offered to teach him hairstyling for free so that he could do Theresa's hair at home for her. Small sacrifices and extra efforts are what makes true love and they inspire others to do the same for their loved ones.

**SOME INTERESTING STATS** - A new Pew Research study has found that in the United States, young adults are 17% less likely to identify with a religious group than older adults. While the study, which was conducted in 106 countries over the last decade, found a similar pattern happening elsewhere in the world, it also revealed that the phenomenon is far from universal. While younger adults were less likely to identify with a religion than older ones in 41 out of 106 countries, in many places, the gap between the two age groups was relatively small. In fact, the average difference between young and older adults in all countries surveyed was only 5 percentage points. Here are some interesting findings from the study ...

#### Where is the biggest gap between young and old adults?

The countries with the biggest gaps between young and older adults in terms of religious affiliation are in Europe and the Americas:

- \* In the U.S. 17% fewer adults under 40 identify with a religious group than do their elders.
- \* In Canada the gap between younger and older adults is 28%.
- \* Denmark has the largest gap (26%) among European countries surveyed.
- \*Uruguay (18%), the Dominican Republic (17%), and Chile (13%) have the biggest gaps in Latin America. In Latin America and the Caribbean there is a 14% gap; there is a 12% gap in the Middle East and North Africa; a 10% gap in Asia-Pacific; and a 3% gap in Sub-Saharan Africa.

#### Where are young people just as religious as their elders?

In two countries, Chad and Ghana, young people are actually more likely to identify with a religion than are older people.

In 63 countries, there is no difference in religiosity between younger and older adults. These include the following predominately Christian countries: Armenia, Belarus, Bosnia-Herzegovina, Botswana, Bulgaria, Cameroon, Colombia, Croatia, Democratic Republic of the Congo, Ethiopia, Georgia, Greece, Guatemala, Honduras,

Hungary, Kenya, Liberia, Moldova, Mozambique, Nigeria, Paraguay, Peru, the Philippines, Romania, Rwanda, Serbia, South Africa, Tanzania, Uganda, Ukraine and Zambia.

Predominately Muslim countries where there is no gap between younger and older adults include Afghanistan, Albania, Algeria, Azerbaijan, Bangladesh, Burkina Faso, Djibouti, Egypt, Guinea-Bissau, Indonesia, Iran, Iraq, Jordan, Kazakhstan, Kosovo, Kyrgyzstan, Lebanon, Malaysia, Mali, Morocco, Niger, Pakistan, Palestinian territories, Senegal, Tajikistan, Tunisia, Turkey and Uzbekistan.

The study found that these results don't necessarily mean that the world is getting less religious. The countries which are most religious tend to grow the fastest. In Niger, for example, where 86% of those surveyed said religion is very important in their lives, the population is expected to quadruple between 2015 and 2060. On the flip side, in Japan where only 10% said religion was very important, the population is expected to shrink by 20% in that time.

**A LESSON FROM A HAPPILY MARRIED COUPLE -** This year, Maryanne and Tommy Pilling celebrated 23 years of wedded bliss. When they exchanged their vows they became the first couple with Down syndrome to marry, facing much criticism and predictions that their union would never stay the course. Yet the two seem

happier than ever, and it's all thanks to their two secrets to happiness, as well as the support of their loving family and community. The couple first met more than 24 years ago while working in a kitchen in a center that helps adults with learning challenges. It was love at first sight. An excited Maryanne explained to Echo News: "I had never been so happy in my life before. I thought he was very handsome and adorable." They went on a first date and that was it. "Tommy made a really good impression," says Maryanne. Tommy, too, was hooked, and after 18 months of dating he was ready to ask his girlfriend, 13 years his junior, to marry him. Although he didn't have the money for a ring, he wasn't dissuaded and thought about buying one from a vending machine. Luckily, when Maryanne's mom, Linda Newman, heard of his intentions, she took him to do a little ring shopping in a jewelry store. When Tommy finally proposed to Maryanne she "jumped with joy," according to *Today*. The couple wed at St. Mary's Church in Southend, England, amid much criticism from people who didn't believe people with Down syndrome should marry. Fortunately, this is where Maryanne's family stepped in and offered their support. As Maryanne's sister, Lindi, points out: "Anything is possible with love and there should be no limitations for anyone, no matter what their circumstances are." After their wedding the couple moved in with Maryanne's mom, before taking on their own apartment just across the road. Although they need daily help, like many other couples they have shared interests and enjoy cooking, playing a round of golf, as well as a bit of bowling. While Tommy has no family of his own, his wife's family are dedicated to caring for him. After a stint in hospital, he and Maryanne moved back in with her mom for three weeks to take extra care of him. As Maryanne's sister explained, their mom has been a constant source of support for the couple "from day one." And it is no doubt that the couple's success story is partly down to this maternal devotion. And Lindi's love and involvement is also plain to see. She runs a Facebook page for the couple, and has posted many photos of them looking still as in love as they were when they first met all those years ago. Lindi wants to inspire the world with the wonderful story of her sister whose life is so full of joy. So what is their secret? How have they kept their marriage alive when so many others fail? Lindi puts it down to two simple things: "There is never a hidden agenda. They love each other with their whole hearts and are honest with one another." It also helps that Maryanne's chattiness is balanced with Tommy's tendency to be more reserved. As for the couple's future plans, this year happened to be a big one for Tommy, as he celebrated his 60th birthday on World Down Syndrome Day. He celebrated by having a party with his loved ones and neighbors. As the couple continues to defy their critics and enjoy a rewarding relationship, we wish them many years of love and happiness ahead.
