HOLYDAY OF OBLIGATION – Thursday of this week is All Saints Day, a holyday of obligation. All Saints is the feast that commemorates the feast day of all the saints, including those who are not formally canonized who stand before God in his beatific vision. Translation – if your grandmother is in heaven and isn't canonized this is her feast day. Since union with God is the reason you exist, making sure that you celebrate this day is vitally important. Masses are at Noon at the Sacred Heart site and at 7:00 PM at the St. John site. While not a holyday of obligation, Friday is All Souls Day, a day we pray for the Poor Souls in Purgatory. Since your loved ones may need your prayers, it is a laudable to attend Mass on that day as well (or at least visit the cemetery). Following Mass on All Souls Day there will be a visit to the cemetery and a brief prayer service.

ST. VINCENT ARCHABBEY MISSIONS - This weekend Fr. Wulfstan is here to make an appeal for the missions of St. Vincent Archabbey. The monks have maintained missions in Taiwan and Brazil for many year, and are able to help train priests at their seminary in Latrobe for service abroad. Please be generous in your support. PRAYING FOR THE DEAD - This week we celebrate All Souls Day, a day where pray for the dead in a particular way. Father Joe Scott explains why Catholics pray for the faithful departed (Protestant Christians, while having many differences, typically do not pray for the dead). The earliest Scriptural reference to prayers for the dead comes in the second book of Maccabees. The books of Maccabees were among the latest written books found in the Old Testament. They recount the struggle of the Jewish people for freedom against the Seleucid Empire, around 100-200 years before the birth of Christ. They are written from an Orthodox Jewish point of view. The second book of Maccabees tells how Judas Maccabee, the Jewish leader, led his troops into battle in 163 B.C. When the battle ended he directed that the bodies of those Jews who had died be buried. As soldiers prepared their slain comrades for burial, they discovered that each was wearing an amulet taken as booty from a pagan Temple. This violated the law of Deuteronomy and so Judas and his soldiers prayed that God would forgive the sin these men had committed (II Maccabees 12:39-45). This is the first indication in the Bible of a belief that prayers offered by the living can help free the dead from any sin that would separate them from God in the life to come. It is echoed in the New Testament when Paul offers a prayer for a man named Onesiphorus who had died: "May the Lord grant him to find mercy from the Lord on that day" (II Timothy 1:18). The cavelike tombs under the city of Rome, which we call catacombs, bear evidence that members of the Roman Christian community gathered there to pray for their fellow followers of Christ who lay buried there. By the fourth century prayers for the dead are mentioned in Christian literature as though they were already a longstanding custom. The practice of praying for the dead is rooted first in Christian belief in the everlasting life promised in Jesus' teachings and foreshadowed by his disciple's experience that God had raised him from the dead. After death, even though separated from our earthly body, we yet continue a personal existence. It is as living persons that God invites us into a relationship whose life transcends death. Praying for the dead has further origins in our belief in the communion of saints. Members of this community who are living often assist each other in faith by prayers and other forms of spiritual support. Christians who have died continue to be members of the communion of saints. We believe that we can assist them by our prayers, and they can assist us by theirs. The prayers express hope that God will free the person who has died from any burden of sin and prepare a place for him or her in heaven. Death remains a mystery for us-a great unknown. Yet Christian language evokes a hopeful imagination in the presence of death, an assurance that our love, linked to Christ's love, can help bridge whatever barriers might keep those whom we love from fully enjoying the presence of a loving and life-giving God.

PRIESTS ON THE TITANIC - This past week Fr. Aron is on a cruise, his first ever, and has spent some time thinking about what he is going to do if it hits an iceberg (it is a cruise in the Mediterranean so he thinks he is safe). As he stated, "I'm too fat to swim to land, and will probably be late getting out to the lifeboat." This past April marked the 106th Anniversary of the sinking of the famed RMS *Titanic*. A little known fact is that there were three priests on the *Titanic* when it sunk on after striking an iceberg on April 14, 1912. Father Thomas Byles was journeying to New York City aboard the *Titanic* to say the Mass at his brother William's wedding. After graduating from Oxford in 1894 he served as a parish priest in England, working in a small, very poor parish. While on the Titanic he said Masses for the second and third class passengers. When the ship hit the iceberg he was on the upper deck praying his breviary and immediately sprang into action. He assisted many third class passengers up onto the boat deck and into life boats. He heard confessions and prayed the rosary as the ship sank. He twice refused to go aboard the lifeboats himself. The other priests on the *Titanic* were Father Juozas Montvila, a 27 year old priest from Lithuania fleeing Tsarist oppression, and Father Joseph Benedikt Peruschitz O.S.B., a 41 year old Catholic priest from Germany who was on his way to join the faculty at Saint John's Abbey in Collegeville, Minnesota. Both Frs. Montvila and Peruschitz also refused to board lifeboats and instead went among the passengers, Catholic and non-Catholic alike and prayed with them as they prepared for their deaths. All three priests died aboard the Titanic. May they rest in peace.

SO ARE MORMONS CHRISTIANS? - Fr. Leo Walsh answers this question that comes up from time to time as we encounter members of the Church of Jesus Christ of Latter Day Saints (Mormons) - While the members of the "Church of Jesus Christ of Latter Day Saints" consider themselves "Christians" very few Christians would recognize the Jesus that is taught by the LDS. While they use "Christian," the same words that other Christians use, the meanings they attribute to those words are actually quite different. For example, they Mormons do have the same belief in the nature of God as Christians do. According to the Articles of Faith on their own materials, God is rather malleable is simply "exalted man." "We believe in a God who is Himself progressive, whose majesty is intelligence; whose perfection consists in eternal advancement — a Being who has attained His exalted state by a path which now His children are permitted to follow, whose glory it is their heritage to share. In spite of the opposition of the sects, in the face of direct charges of blasphemy, the Church proclaims the eternal truth: 'As man is, God once was; as God is, man may be.'" (LDS Apostle James E. Talmage, Articles of Faith, Ch.24, p.430 – p.431, LDS Collectors Library '97 CD-

ROM) This is very a different and much diminished appreciation of God when compared to the Christian notion of the transcendent God who is the uncreated author of all life, the very source of Being itself, who very nature it is to exist. It can be very confusing talking with an LDS member because they use the same terms that we do, but attribute very different meanings to them. Because of this very different theology of God, among other reasons, the Catholic Church does not consider Mormon baptism to be a valid Christian baptism. This does not mean that we can't work with the LDS organization in matters that pertain to religious freedom, the sanctity of marriage, and family life. But one should hold no illusions that they share the same essential beliefs that we do even if they use similar words.
