FAITH AND SCIENCE - On a recent episode of The Late Show, host Stephen Colbert and frequent visitor Neil deGrasse Tyson joked about the astronomical insignificance of New Year's Day. Before long, Tyson was talking about the role the Catholic Church played in creating the calendar as we know it. "The world's calendar is the Gregorian calendar after Pope Gregory," Tyson explains. "Put that into place in 1582, because the previous Julian calendar was messing up in the year. It was off by ten days. And the pope said, 'We got to fix this...' There's a Vatican Observatory to this day. At the time, before telescopes were invented, these Jesuit priests were put into the service of figuring out why the calendar was shifting in the year." Colbert, known for his openness about his Catholic faith, then asks Tyson if it's true that a Catholic priest formulated the Big Bang Theory. "Yes," Tyson responds. "Georges Lemaître. Using Einstein's equations ... he deduces that the history of the universe must've started with a bang. So Catholics have been in there in multiple places." This little exchange might have seemed uninteresting in another era, but not today. The rise in the new atheism and Biblical literalism have made it a commonplace that science and religion are in conflict, and young people are absorbing the idea as axiomatic. In her recent book *iGen*, about the least religious generation in U.S. history, Dr. Jean Twenge quotes one young person as saying: "I knew from church that I couldn't believe in both science and God, so that was it. I didn't believe in God anymore." That may be true in some churches, but not the Catholic Church - and it's worth repeating just as often as the opportunity allows. In Catholicism, belief in science and God are compatible. In fact, Tyson and Colbert's conversation is a glaring reminder that many Catholic priests and believers have been leading scientists themselves. There are theological and historical reasons for this, but the bottom line is this: Catholicism is a science-friendly religion, and it's enshrined in the Catholic Catechism. Even at the peak of the new atheism and its mockery of all things religious in the 2000s, one man seemed to draw the respect and attention of people like Richard Dawkins and Bill Maher: Fr. George Coyne, a priest and astrophysicist who ran the Vatican Observatory outside of Tucson. His very existence was a challenge to the view that religion "poisons" rational, scientific thinking - Coyne represented an intriguing third option outside of the fray (interestingly enough Darwin's On

the Origin of Species was never on the Vatican's Index of Forbidden Books). Catholic scientists were not only behind the formation of the calendar and the formulation of the Big Bang Theory: they were behind groundbreaking discoveries about the size of the earth (Fr. Jean-Félix Picard), pasteurization (Louis Pasteur), and genetics (Fr. Gregor Mendel). In fact, one of the first people to correctly explain rainbows was a 13th-century Dominican friar! There's Roger Bacon, Pascal, Descartes – the list goes on and on. The Church's unfortunate treatment of Galileo (whether the actual events, or the mythical spin on the events lodged in our collective consciousness) was, at worst, a brief spat in a long and respectful friendship. And Copernicus and Galileo, let's not forget, were both Catholics themselves. Copernicus was himself a cleric, Galileo's daughter was a nun. While the universe is fascinating and mysterious, what we do know is this: when it comes to putting the tools of observation and the light of reason to good use, science has an ally in the Catholic Church.

The instructor will be Lawrence G. Kozlowski, a "Commonwealth of Pennsylvania, Master Folk Craftsman" and Recipient of the "Oskar Kolberg -Polish Folklore Award - Polish People's Republic." Mr. Kozlowski will not only teach about a subject, but also give a hands-on instruction on how to make a folk art item. The "Hands-On" portions of the class are designed to offer everyone the opportunity to experience their Polish Heritage remembering the traditions of old, sharing the practices of today with a legacy for future generations to treasure, honor and observe. Polish culture stresses a deep solidarity with nature, a profound respect for human life, a resilient hope, and a vibrant faith. If you have ever wishes that you had asked your ancestors about traditions and never did so this course may help recapture some lost traditions. Traditions without meaning fade away, please consider taking this course so that these powerful customs may continue. There will be no cost for the materials, all that is asked is that those who take the class try to attend as many as possible. Monday, February 12th - POLAND: The Land, Its Origins & Its People. - This workshop will explore the country of Poland and the origin of its people from its acceptance of Christianity in 966 A.D. Regional differences of the Polish Language with simple phrases will be explored. The origins of Polish Surnames will also be found, answering the question "What Does My Polish Name Mean?"

Monday, February 19th - POLAND: Its Faith, Families & Traditions - The structure of the Polish Family both in Poland and in the Polish-American homes is special and unique. It is centered around the Church with each home becoming a "Modicum Ecclesia", "Maly Kosciol" or "Little Church." Seasonal customs and traditions will be shared and a family tree will be created. Bring your old family records (Birth Certificates, Sacramental Certificates including Baptismal, Confirmation, Holy Communion and Death Certificates.) to record in your very own frame-able "Family Tree". Sto Lat ! - One Hundred Years!

Monday, February 26th - POLAND: The Celebration of a Polish Christmas - With the sighting of the first star Christmas Eve on December 24th the family prepares to celebrate "Wigilia". The fresh clean straw on the family table, the breaking of the Oplatek and the sharing of the meatless meal this evening this is the essence of a Polish Christmas Eve. Recipes, customs and traditions will be available. Each and every guest will bake their own Polish Christmas Wafer from scratch to share next Christmas Eve.

Monday, March 12th - POLAND: The Celebration of a Polish Easter - After 40-days of Lenten fasting, the Polish Kitchen is busy with sights, and smells in the creation of the age-old foods to fill a traditional Easter Basket. The symbolic foods are then taken to be blessed in parish church to celebrate the "Swieconka" on Holy Saturday. The traditions of Holy Week from Palm Sunday, Holy Thursday, Good Friday, Holy Saturday and Easter Sunday will be

visited including the creation of "Home Made Kielbassa" will be enjoyed by all. The Polish-American folk art of Palm Weaving will afford you to take home a Sacramental Palm Weaving this night.

Monday, March 19th - POLAND: The Creation Of Polish Easter Eggs - "Pisanki" or decorated Easter Eggs have their century-old origins among the Slavic People (Poles, Slovaks, Czechs, Lithuanians and Ukrainians). These wax ornamented eggs were created to be blessed in the Holy Saturday Easter Baskets, shared among family members. They symbolized the Resurrection of Jesus Christ at Easter.
